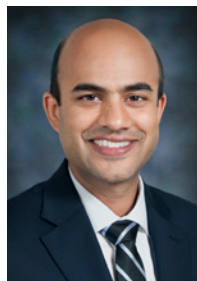

Assistant Chief of Orthopaedics

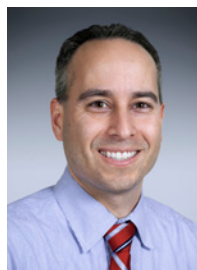

The Hip in Children with Cerebral Palsy – Surveillance to Salvage

Friday, October 2, 2015

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About the Seminar

Presented by the faculty at Shriners Hospitals for Children — Northern California, *The Hip in Children with Cerebral Palsy – Surveillance to Salvage* brings together doctors, nurses and therapists to openly discuss and address ways to preserve hip function in children with cerebral palsy. Hip dysplasia is a common problem in children with cerebral palsy, and optimal treatment involves an understanding of the pathoanatomy, pathophysiology and both the pharmacologic and surgical treatment options. All participants will learn how they can be part of a multi-disciplinary hip surveillance program for children with cerebral palsy.

Target Audience: Physicians, Nurses, Physical Therapists and Occupational Therapists.

Cost: \$65. Fee includes course materials, lunch and 6.0 contact hours.

Location: Presentations will take place in the first-floor auditorium of Shriners Hospitals for Children — Northern California, 2425 Stockton Boulevard in Sacramento. Just minutes from the State Capitol, Old Sacramento, museums and the central business district, the Northern California Shriners Hospital is located adjacent to the University of California Davis Medical Center in the heart of a growing medical community. Free parking is available in the Shriners Hospital parking garage.

Program Objectives: At the end of the seminar participants should be able to:

- Identify the pathoanatomy, pathophysiology and treatment options (pharmacologic and surgical) for children with hip dysplasia;
- Describe the multi-disciplinary hip surveillance program to be implemented in Northern California in 2016;
- Develop treatment plans for children with neuromuscular hip disorders;
- Demonstrate radiographic assessment techniques of the hip in children with cerebral palsy.
